COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Bi103 is a survey course covering the synoptic gospels, Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Key elements to be studied during this course will include:

- What makes the synoptic gospels "synoptic"
- The narrative genres used in the synoptic gospels.
- The historic and cultural back ground of the synoptics
- The gospel parables and miracles
- Who is this Jesus presented in the synoptics.
