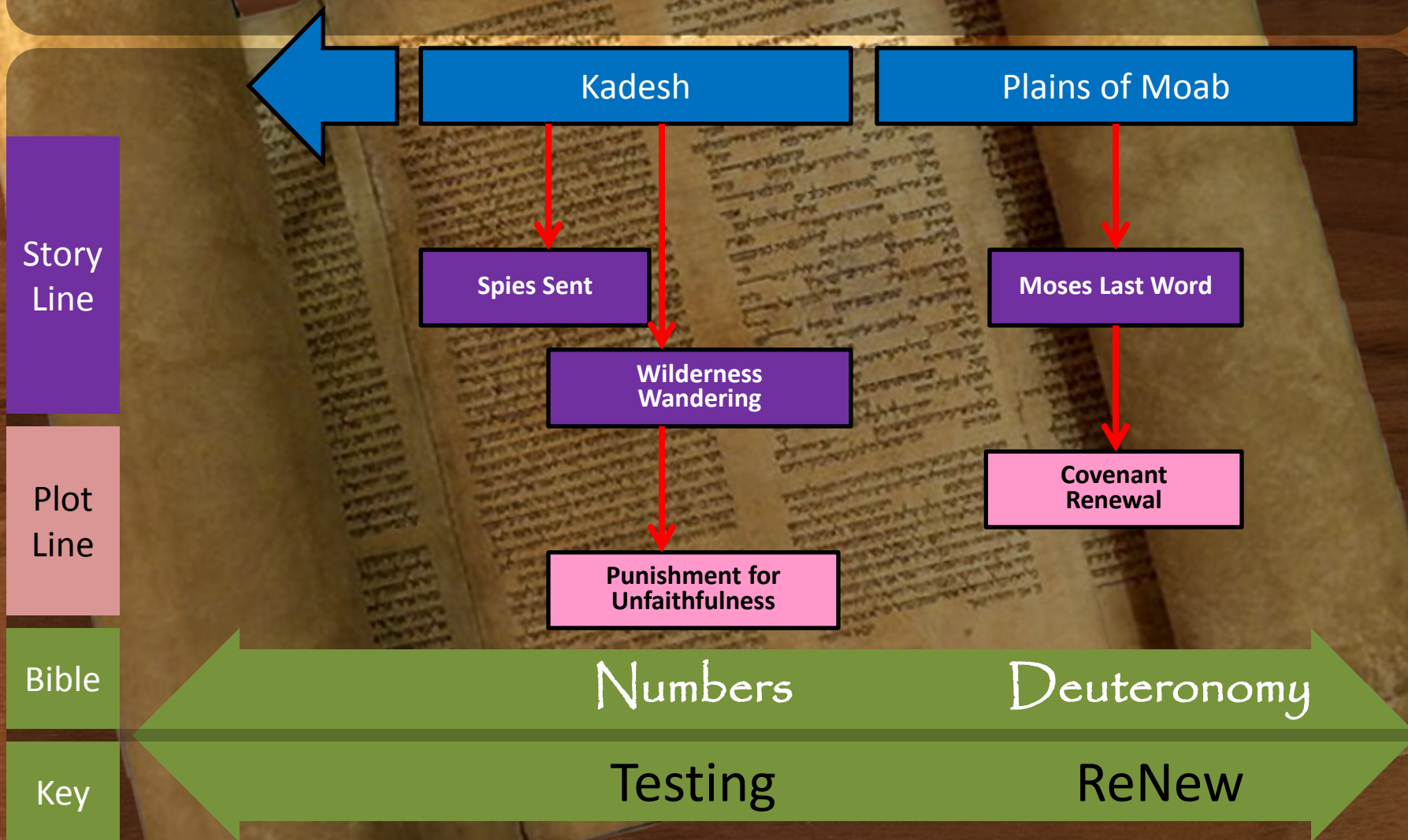

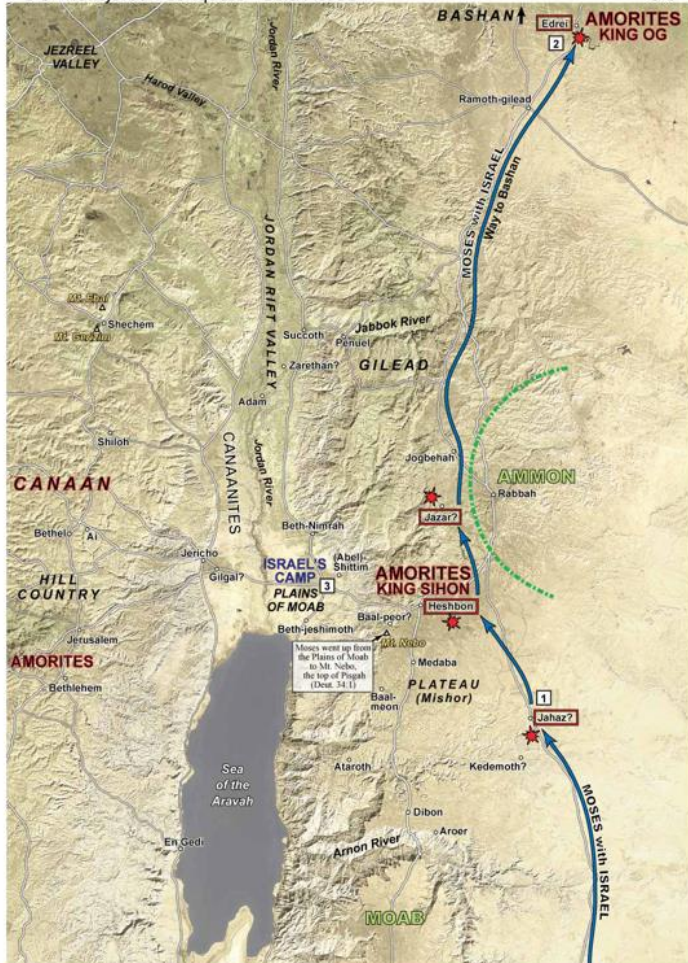
The Flow of the Pentateuch

Key Concepts

As we begin Deuteronomy

- Deuteronomy 5:3 (ESV) ³Not with our fathers did the LORD make this covenant, but with us, who are all of us here alive today.
- Moses is telling this 2nd generation, the Covenant was not your fathers ~ It is with US, those that are now alive. Making it personal, and not history.
