COURSE DESCRIPTION:
Gk101 is an introduction to the original Biblical languages of Hebrew and Greek and the application of this introduction to the advancement of Biblical excepsis. Key areas to be studied during this course will include

Beginning Hebrew including the alphabet, pronunciation, and language fundamentals

Beginning Koine Greek including the alphabet, pronunciation, and language fundamentals.

Biblical excepsis using your English bible, and basic Hebrew and Greek study aids.
