### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

Gk101 is an introduction to the original Biblical languages of Hebrew and Greek and the application of this introduction to the advancement of Biblical exegesis. Key areas to be studied during this course will include

- Beginning Hebrew including the alphabet, pronunciation, and language fundamentals
- Beginning Koine Greek including the alphabet, pronunciation, and language fundamentals.
- Biblical exegesis using your English bible, and basic Hebrew and Greek study aids.

### **PREREQUISITE:**

### **STATEMENT OF MISSION:**

- Know the Hebrew and Greek alphabets, able to pronounce, write and transliterate each letter and words.
- Be able to describe the structure of the Hebrew and Greek language
- Be able to use Reverse Interlinears, concordances, dictionaries, and lexicons in the creation of detailed word studies

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- Be aware of advanced computer tools and internet based tools to assist in their Bible studies.

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### Course information to guide your reading and preparation of the course assignments

#### COURSE REQUIREMENTS and GRADING:<sup>1</sup>

1	Attendance: This class is a three unit class and is scheduled for 14-3 hour classes. It is expected that students will be in attendance at all classes. If acceptable arrangements are made with the instructor prior to a class session it may be missed without duress, but if no arrangements are made then 10 points will be deducted from the Maximum Attendance Points.	50 pts MAX
2	Class Participation: Class participation will be important to student learning with both interactive reading, memorization recitation and participating in class discussions. The instructor will award up to 50 points based on his observation in class.	50 pts MAX
3	Bible Memorization (4@12.5) There will be four passages that the student will be expected to memorize. These are to be recited and recorded by other members of the class. Additionally the memory verses will be part of the content tested in the quizzes and exams.	50 pts from Memory Log
4	Bible Reading (4, see assignments for individual points) There will be two Bible passages that will need to be read for understanding. Additionally, each of these passages will be read in their original source language. Each Reading Assignment sheet will be handed out the week before the readings are scheduled to be complete.	50 pts from Reading Log
5	Assigned Reading (4@12.5) There will be four reading assignments that will be handed out during the semester. Reading is to be completed by the following class period and logged on the Reading Assignment sheet	50 pts from Reading Log
6	Homework (4@50) There will be four homework assignments which are synchronized with the lectures. Homework is due at the beginning of the class following the week it is assigned. Late assignments will only be accepted if arranged prior to the due date and there may be a 5 point reduction for the paper (10%).	200
7	Quiz (2@75) There will be two quizzes, one focused on the Greek alphabet and one focused on the Hebrew alphabet.	150
8	Intermediate Exams (2@100). There will be two intermediate exams. The first will be a comprehensive exam on the Greek class material. The second will be a comprehensive exam on the Hebrew class material.	200
9	Exegesis Project. This project will be assigned by the instructor and require the student to interact with both a New Testament and an Old Testament Bible text. The student will produce a report on their texts exhibiting the passage's phrasing, investigations of key words and the thoughts of the passage. This report is to be presented to the class orally and to the instructor	50 pts ORAL 100 pts written

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	in a manuscript form. <i>Detailed project information will be released on March 22<sup>nd</sup></i>	
10	Final Exam (take home). The final will be a one week duration take home exam. It will examine the ability of the student to do word studies, and Biblical exegesis using skills and techniques that were introduced during this course. Additionally the student will be expected to utilize the Greek and Hebrew tools that they have been exposed to. This exam will encompass working with multiple Biblical texts, each one looking for the application of an exegesis skill. This will be an open book, open notes, <b>closed neighbor</b> exam.	150

**NOTES REGARDING GRADING:**
